Expanding access for adult learners is vital to meeting enrollment goals and also key to meeting workforce needs and equipping adult learners with SCNC with the skills and credentials necessary for the most in-demand and rewarding jobs. While some challenges to returning are well-known—family obligations, work requirements, stranded credits—sometimes, a lesser-known impediment gets in the way of a student’s ability to return: failure to make satisfactory academic progress (SAP) in their prior enrollment. In this interactive session, we'll discuss the growing population of adult learners and the data available on the subpopulation that can't easily access federal student aid dollars due to SAP. We'll share innovative ways states and systems are helping students navigate their SAP constraints and the policy decisions institutions can make to better serve adult learners in this predicament.
