CC empowers individuals and communities around the world through technical, legal, and policy solutions that enable the sharing of education, culture, and science in the public interest.



CC Certificate courses: Get CC Certified in open licensing!

- Courses offer Q&A with copyright lawyers, open advocates, accessibility coaches and asynchronous project work.
- Time commitment: 10 weeks online, or 1-week "bootcamp."

CC license elements

There are four license elements that make up the six CC licenses




Attribution (BY)
All licenses
contain this – the
creator gets a
specific form of
credit



Non-Commercial (NC)
It means the work is only available for uses that do not intend commercial gain. 3 licenses contain this condition



Share-Alike (SA)
It means that any
adaptation of the
work must be
licensed under the
same license. 2
CC licenses
contain this
condition.



No-Derivatives (ND)
It means that anyone who reuses this work cannot share adaptations of the work. 2 CC licenses contain this condition.


