A Look at Midwestern Open Education Successes

What We've Built Together (and Why It Matters)

- This work reflects your leadership across 12 states
- Built over multiple years, not overnight
- Designed for long-term, statewide impact

Capacity First, Adoption Follows

- Focus on systems, not single courses
- Invest in people, coordination, and infrastructure
- Accept uneven starting points across states

State Teams as the Engine of the Work

- 12 active OER State Action Teams
- Cross-sector representation
- Regular coordination and shared learning

From MHEC-Led to State-Led

- Independent statewide meetings and summits
- State-defined priorities and agendas
- Leadership emerging from within states

What Changed Because of This Work

- OER State Action Teams established in all 12 MHEC states
- 8 states now host independent statewide OER convenings or planning bodies
- State-led leadership, agendas, and priorities emerging across the region
- Shared language and frameworks for statewide OER capacity

From Grant Dollars to On-the-Ground Results

- State subgrants deployed in 12 states each grant period
- First-ever statewide OER conferences in multiple states
- Faculty communities of practice, leadership stipends, and training launched
- New or strengthened OER hubs, repositories, and publishing pathways

What “Capacity Building” Looked Like in Practice

- Illinois: exploring a sustainable statewide OER publishing model
- Indiana: coordinating leadership + evaluating OER for core transfer pathways
- Michigan & North Dakota: statewide OER conferences and infrastructure growth
- Minnesota & South Dakota: Grants for under-resourced institutions

From Midwest Practice to National Influence

- Midwest states informed national OER course marking guidance
- Cross-compact collaboration elevated state perspectives
- Lessons from state teams reflected in national tools and conversations

Progress Is Real — and Uneven by Design

- No state meets all capacity indicators
- Strengths vary across policy, infrastructure, engagement
- Clear signals about where to focus next

The Value of Doing This Work Together

- Midwestern Open Education Summits
- Peer problem-solving
- Shared tools, language, and approaches

Looking Back to Move Forward Together

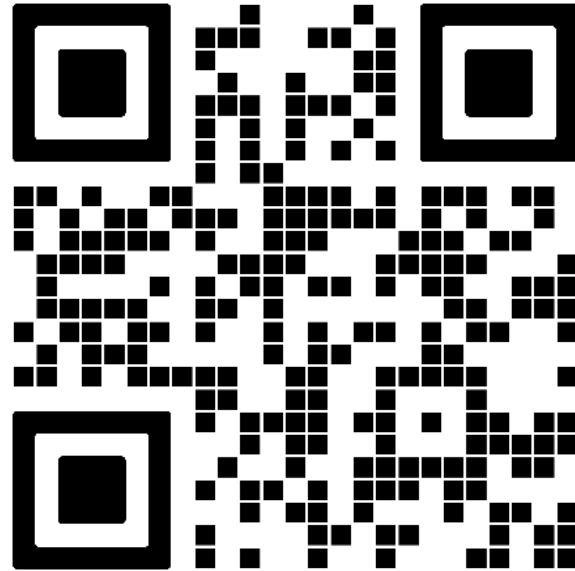
- Shared baseline for Summit conversations

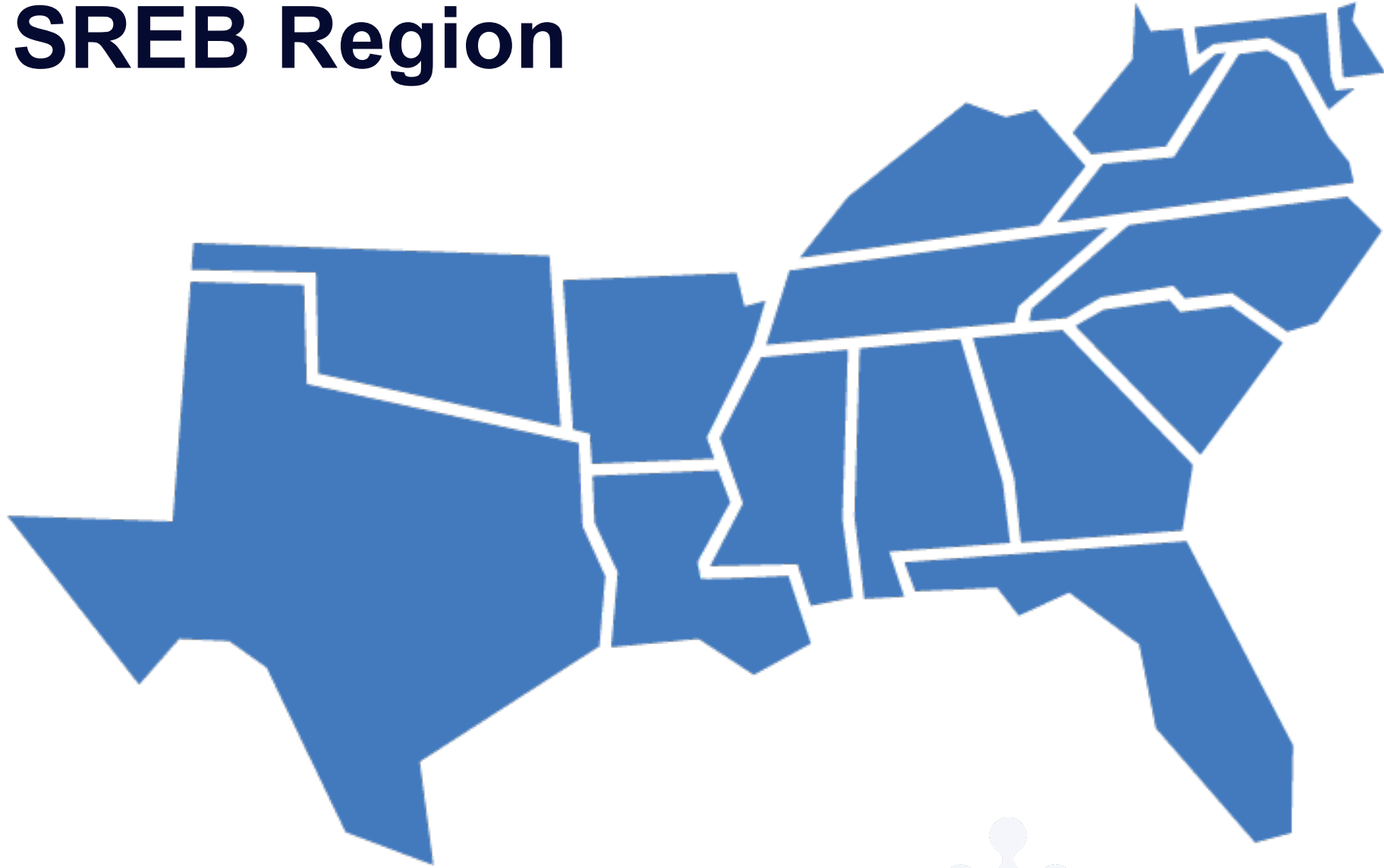

According to The Barthwell Group, Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCU's) and Minority Serving Institutions (MSIs) face many barriers that hinder their ability to adopt and implement OER.



Grant Overview

GRANT AMOUNT

Seven selected institutions will receive \$10,000 for OER initiatives.

COLLABORATION

ENCOURAGED

Institutions are urged to work together across departments.

GRANT DURATION

The grant period lasts 12 months for capacity building.

TECHNICAL SUPPORT PLAN

SREB will assist with effective implementation and strategies.

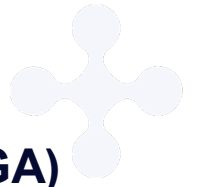

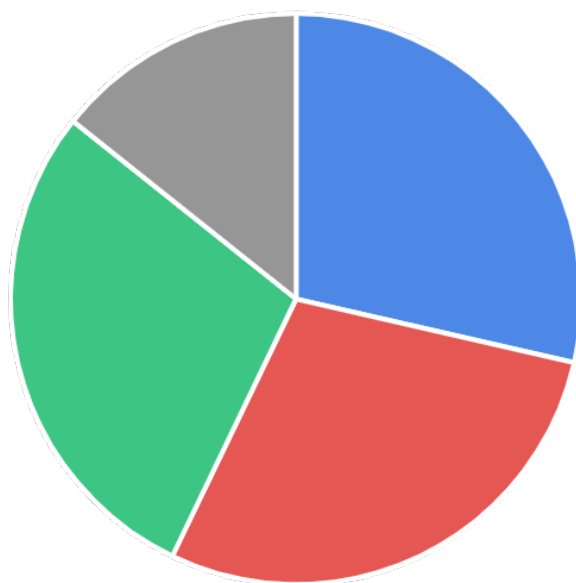

Distribution of Minority Serving Institutions in Cohort (institutions)

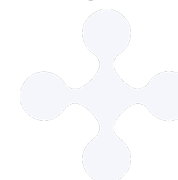


● **2 Hispanic Serving Institution (HSI)**

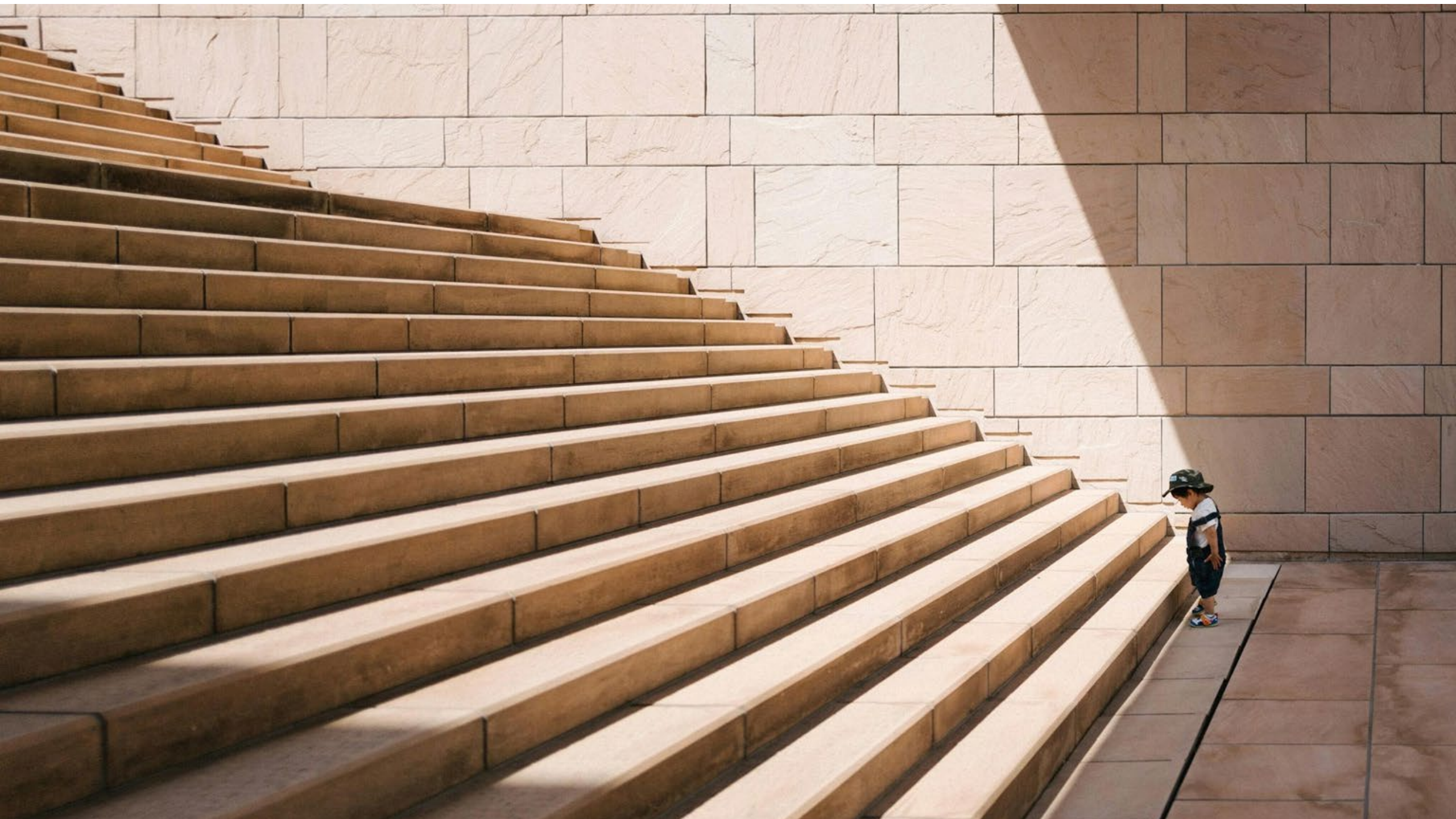

WICHE REGION

WHAT IS WICHE?

- ▶ An interstate compact formed by the Western Governors in 1953
- ▶ Congressional action signed in 1953 by President Dwight D. Eisenhower

The Western Regional Education COMPACT

Entered into by and between the States and Territories signatory hereto, to provide acceptable and efficient educational facilities to meet the needs of the Western Region of the United States of America.

I WHEREAS, the future of this Nation and of the Western States is dependent upon the quality of the education of its youth; and

WHEREAS, many of the Western States individually do not have sufficient numbers of potential students to warrant the establishment and maintenance within their borders of adequate facilities in all of the essential fields of technical, professional, and graduate training, nor do all the states have the financial ability to furnish within their borders institutions capable of providing acceptable standards of training in all of the fields mentioned above; and

WHEREAS, it is believed that the Western States, or groups of such states within the Region, cooperatively can provide acceptable and efficient educational facilities to meet the needs of the Region and of the students thereof;

Now, therefore, the States of Arizona, California, Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon, Utah, Washington, and Wyoming, and the Territories of Alaska and Hawaii do hereby Covenant and agree as follows:

II Each of the compacting states and territories pledges to each of the other compacting states and territories faithful cooperation in carrying out all the purposes of this Compact.

III The compacting states and territories hereby create the Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education, hereinafter

called the Commission. Said Commission shall be a body corporate of each compacting state and territory and an agency thereof. The Commission shall have all the powers and duties set forth herein, including the power to sue and be sued, and such additional powers as may be conferred upon it by subsequent action of the respective legislatures of the compacting states and territories.

IV The Commission shall consist of three resident members from each compacting state or territory. At all times one Commissioner from each compacting state or territory shall be an educator engaged in the field of higher education in the state or territory from which he is appointed.

The Commissioners from each state and territory shall be appointed by the Governor thereof as provided by law in such state or territory from which he shall have been appointed.

The terms of each Commissioner shall be four years. Provided, however, that the first three Commissioners shall be appointed as follows: one for two years, one for three years, and one for four years. Each Commissioner shall hold office until his successor shall be appointed and qualified. If any office becomes vacant for any reason, the Governor shall appoint a Commissioner to fill the office for the remainder of the unexpired term.

V Any business transacted at any meeting of the Commission must be by affirmative vote of a majority of the whole number of compacting states and territories.

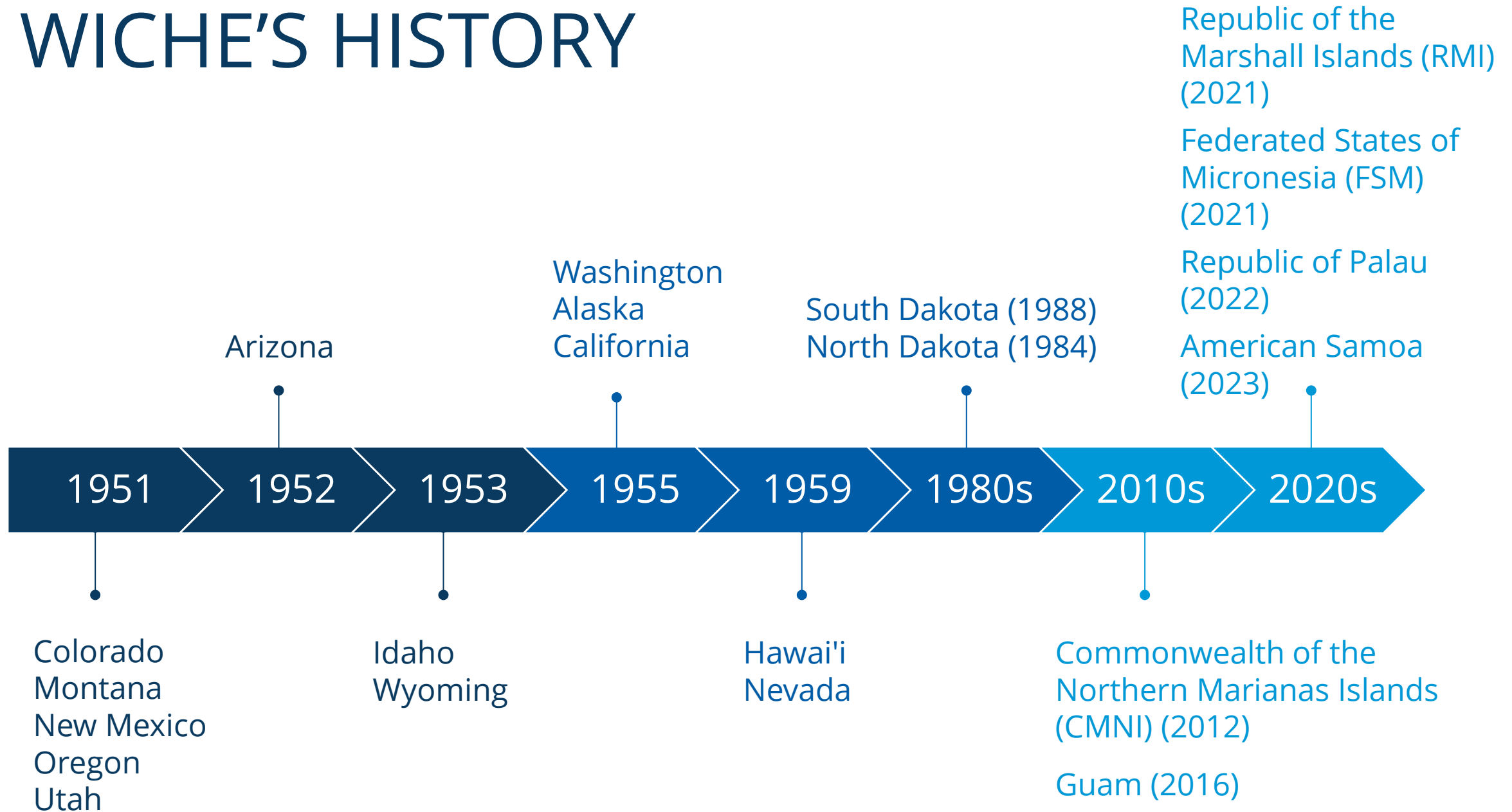


WICHE'S MISSION

WICHE'S HISTORY



State Spotlight: Colorado

- The OER grant program launched in 2018 with three years of funding from H.B. 18-1331
- The program was expanded an additional five years through S.B. 21-215
- The OER adopted, adapted, or created in the first six cycles of the grant program has **saved Colorado students over \$59.7 million in textbook costs** to date. The cumulative cost savings for the first six years of the grant program are projected to surpass \$75 million in spring 2026. State Spotlight: New Mexico

- New Mexico OER Consortium was officially *funded by the Department of Education in 2024* with a \$2.125 million grant.
- Also funded by the *state of New Mexico's investments* in equitable education, including the NM Opportunity Scholarship, the NM Lottery Scholarship, and State Bill 192, which appropriated \$100,000 to establish an open education resources pilot program at UNM.
- Librarians across UNM, CNM and SFCC work to expand OER across the state and build out OER textbooks.

State Spotlight: Arizona

- Started as a decentralized model with a loose network of institutions
- Mainly Faculty and librarian led with a network of rural colleges developing to advance Open Ed
- There was/is no legislative connection – grassroots led
- Has led to the creation of the OERizona network: a professional learning community committed to providing learners across Arizona (and beyond) unimpeded and equitable access to high-quality learning materials through the promotion of open educational practices.
