OVERVIEW

Michigan enacted authorizing legislation in 1990 to join the Midwestern Higher Education Compact (MHEC). Since that time, commissioners, commissioner alternates, and members of advisory committees from Michigan have provided and continue to provide important governance and strategic direction for MHEC.

HOW MICHIGAN BENEFITS FROM MHEC MEMBERSHIP

Savings and Support

- » **\$19.43M in total annual savings and support** for Michigan colleges, universities, school districts, and state and local governments, a 169-fold return on the annual compact membership commitment
- » \$13.36M in savings for distance education through the Midwestern-State Authorization Reciprocity Agreement
- » \$5.98M in savings through MHEC technology contracts
- » \$75,878 in Master Property Program dividends
- » \$19,228 in capacity building support (state grants, convenings, scholarships and travel grants)

Additional Opportunities and Support

- » Each MHEC member state is eligible for a Strategic Impact and Innovation Grant of up to \$250,000 over two years from MHEC to advance innovative ideas and solutions in higher education.
- » One Michigan institution (Oakland University) will benefit in 2026 by participating in MHEC's student health insurance contract.
- » MHEC continues to provide reports in response to requests from Michigan leaders on topics including measurement of return on investment for higher education.
